### Race and Equity Initiative


- Faculty Assembly recently adopted a "Resolution Concerning Faculty Support for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion on the University of Washington Tacoma"

# 2016-17 Budget Development




### 2016-17 Budget Development

- Process kick-off with CBC <u>Budget 101</u> on December 18<sup>th</sup>
- Budget assumes a 10% Tuition Reduction moving forward
- Budget Assumes a minimum 3% (maybe 4%) compensation target for 2016-17
- Budget assumes minimum backfill from UW Seattle and/ or WA State Legislature (This is #1 UW leg. request)
- With these assumptions as a minimum we will need significant new resources to balance and/or stay even
- Working to match faculty searches with capacity/demand

The number of first-time in college applicants seeking admission to UW Tacoma has increased annually since 2007 and Autumn 2015 set a new application record (1577). This year's applications outpaced 2014 by 14% and were 32% higher than autumn 2013. Rising freshman application rates are one indicator that **UW** Tacoma is contributing to a college-going culture in the South Puget Sound, where 60% of our freshman applicants reside.

# Critical Strategic Initiatives that Can't Wait on the Strategic Plan and need to be developed in Parallel

- Campus needs a comprehensive plan for all academic programs to move toward becoming <u>schools</u>
- Campus needs an active cross-functional <u>strategic enrollment</u> development plan sooner rather than later
- In conjunction with enrollment development, campus needs to carefully weigh <u>budget development</u> and <u>priorities</u> for coming year
- Campus needs a solid plan for the first two year curriculum across <u>all</u> programs focused on both on <u>student learning</u> and <u>success</u>
- UW Tacoma needs to integrate <u>Inclusion</u> and <u>Equity</u> in to all phases of campus life for <u>faculty</u>, <u>staff</u>, and <u>students</u>, thus the reinvigoration of a campus *Race and Equity Steering Committee*


